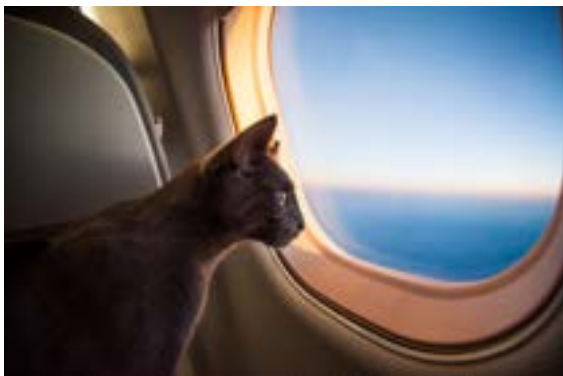

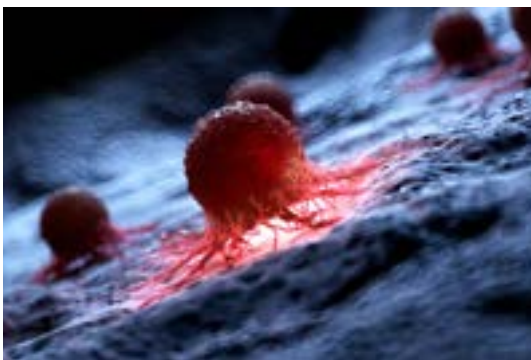

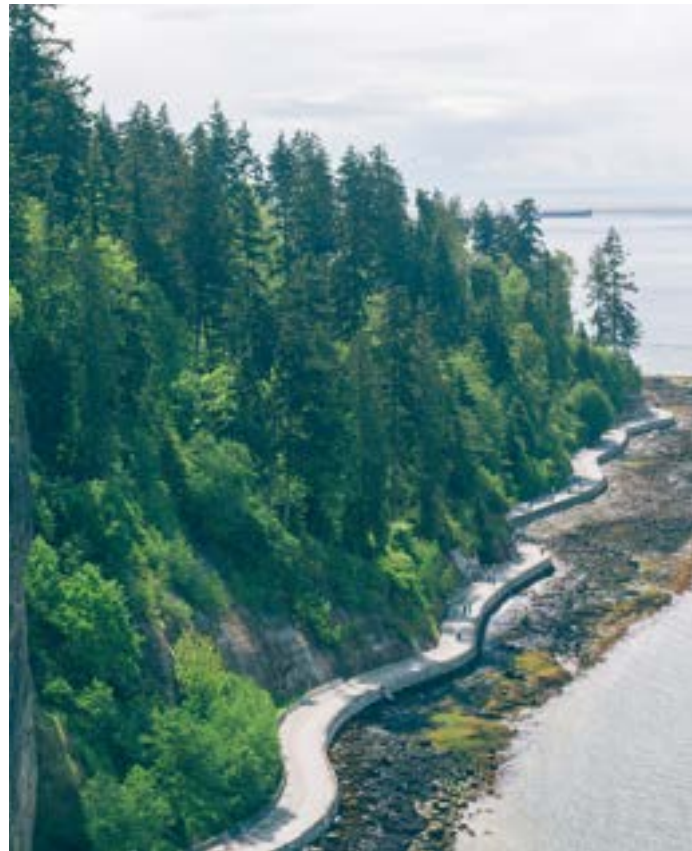

BETWEEN WILD COASTS, COASTAL COMMUNITIES AND FORESTS

In Western Canada, sailing becomes an immersive experience between the Pacific Ocean and temperate rainforests. British Columbia's rugged coastline, dotted with fjords, secluded bays, and seaside villages, offers off-the-beaten-path itineraries, where the boat is the only means of reaching worlds suspended in time.

Every boat trip—whether sailing, catamaran, speedboat, motoryacht, or cruise—is an opportunity to discover marine biodiversity, indigenous communities living in harmony with the land, and floating refuges immersed in the silence of nature. It's more than just sailing: it's listening to the landscape, docking in small artisanal communities, observing orcas in the wild, eagles among the peaks, and life slowly flowing on the water.

Among the most evocative routes: the Inside Passage, the islands of Johnstone Strait, and the calm waters of Desolation Sound. An ideal journey for those seeking a deep connection with nature, with slower pace and vast skies





BRITISH COLUMBIA - BETWEEN SECRET ISLANDS, RAINFORESTS AND THE SILENCE OF THE OCEAN

From the sheltered waters of the **Strait of Georgia**, an itinerary emerges that speaks the silent language of pristine nature. We set sail toward the **Gulf Islands**, an archipelago of forested islands and creative havens, where art galleries, local markets, and hidden trails reveal the most authentic soul of **British Columbia**. The first stop is Salt Spring Island, famous for its ceramic studios and rosy sunsets reflected in the calm sea. The voyage continues through narrow coves and crystalline waters toward **Galiano Island**, where deer and eagles mingle among pine trees and wind-sculpted rocks. A night at anchor here offers the privilege of a clear, starry sky, free from urban interference. Further north, **Hornby Island** welcomes you with its golden beaches and stretches of temperate rainforest, perfect for a day of kayaking and snorkeling in surprisingly clear waters. The most remote heart of the itinerary is reached by skirting the **Sunshine Coast**, where small villages, indigenous communities, and quiet bays tell ancient stories through art, legends, and evening fires. Once ashore, you can explore **Desolation Sound**, one of the most scenic and less traveled stretches of the region, with its warm waters (for its latitude) and rocky walls that seem sculpted to protect the tranquility. The return journey is slow, with close encounters with seals, sea otters, and, with a bit of luck, even orcas or migrating gray whales. The last evening is spent in a hidden bay near **Pender Island**, with only the sound of the water and the surrounding nature to close out a week suspended between wood, ocean, and silence.





MANITOBA - BETWEEN SACRED LAKES, NORTHERN LIGHTS AND FRESHWATER SILENCES

In the heart of Western Canada, far from the beaten track, a freshwater route unfolds that follows the shores of the great **Lake Winnipeg**, one of the continent's largest inland bodies of water. We depart from the south, sailing along tranquil bays where trees are reflected in the lake like mirrors. **Hecla Island** is the first stop: a land of Viking myths and boreal forests, now a protected provincial park, with gravel beaches, slow trails, and colonies of migratory birds. The route continues northwest, past fishing villages and indigenous communities that preserve ancient traditions linked to the water. We dock at small coves along the **Bloodvein River** coast, where you can experience a guided hike into the heart of the subarctic forest, among petroglyphs and stories passed down by word of mouth. A night at anchor here is a journey through time and space: amidst profound silences and skies already beginning to dance green. Further north, you reach **Little Limestone Lake**, the largest meromictic lake in the world, known for its waters that change color with temperature: a breathtaking geological wonder. The journey is slow and meditative, accompanied by sea eagles and, occasionally, the echo of wolves in the distance. The return journey follows the western shores of the lake, between **Grand Rapids** and **Pine Dock**, where the waters become more turbulent but remain protected. The final stop is dedicated to an immersive experience at one of the local reserves, with craft workshops and storytelling under the stars. A final anchorage near the mouth of the **Red River** closes the week, perhaps under a nighttime display of the springtime aurora borealis, visible as early as mid-April on clear nights. A powerful conclusion, uniting water, light, and memory.





INSIDE PASSAGE – BETWEEN LIGHT RAIN, WHALES AND ANCIENT FORESTS

When autumn arrives on Canada's Pacific coast, it does so quietly, with a light rain caressing the sea and painting the forests red and gold. The route begins near **Port Hardy**, at the northern tip of Vancouver Island, and enters the mysterious waters of the **Inside Passage**, among misty islets, deep fjords, and a stillness that speaks only to those who know how to listen. The first leg leads to **Bella Bella**, a community of the **Heiltsuk Nation**, where you can go ashore to visit indigenous art galleries, listen to stories carved into wood, and sample dishes featuring smoked salmon and seaweed. A night at anchor here is pure immersion: the sound of the water lapping and the wind rustling through the red cedars. Continuing north, you reach the **Great Bear Rainforest**, one of the last pristine temperate rainforests in the world. Sailing stops alternate with land explorations among bears, eagles, and streams teeming with rising salmon. With a bit of luck, you might spot the extremely rare Kermode spirit bear, a sacred symbol for the local population. The waters become narrower and deeper around **Princess Royal Island**, where time seems to stand still. Days pass slowly, between silent kayaks in sheltered bays and evenings on board accompanied by the scent of wet wood. An important cultural stop is at **Klemtu**, another First Nations village, where the connection between sea, forest, and identity is revealed in every detail. The return journey skirts the archipelago of **Fiordland Conservancy**, where towering cliffs and seasonal waterfalls create powerful scenery. The journey ends in a silent bay, with the last light of the day reflecting on the gray-green waters of the peaceful autumn: a melancholy yet profoundly rejuvenating farewell.





ALBERTA - BETWEEN ICE, WARM VAPORS AND REFLECTED MOUNTAINS

IDEAL SEASON: FROM LATE DECEMBER TO MID-MARCH

In the heart of the Canadian Rockies, winter transforms everything into poetry: the lakes freeze, the skies become intense, the steam of the warm water meets the snow. This special itinerary takes place on **Lake Minnewanka**, not far from Banff, and the region's navigable lakes, where houseboats and motoryachts equipped for the cold allow for an original, slow, and intimate adventure. We depart from the still waters of Minnewanka, along snow-covered shores home to deer, wolves, and sometimes lone moose. The voyage is short but intense: here, the route is made up of contemplative stops and small landings where you can disembark for hikes on packed snow or snowshoe hikes in the woods. Evenings are spent on board, with large windows overlooking the ice, warm blankets, local cuisine, and a starry sky. The second leg of the journey moves to **Lake Abraham**, a lake famous for its frozen methane bubbles: one of the most photographed phenomena of the Canadian winter. Here you can stop at anchor or at floating lodges, descend onto the frozen surface to skate or photograph the subzero formations, or soak in nearby open-air thermal baths. The route continues to **Lake Louise**, iconic and perfect for a day out on the water: snowshoes, husky sleds, and a hot tea in historic hotels complete the experience. Some local establishments offer hybrid excursions on reinforced-bottom boats that allow you to safely cross stretches that aren't completely frozen. The journey concludes on the **Bow River**, where the ice gives way to stretches of open water, reflecting the snow-capped peaks of the Rockies. A final night moored near **Banff** offers a glimpse of the Northern Lights, sometimes visible even from this latitude, ending the week with an almost mystical atmosphere, between ice, light, and silence.

PRE-CRUISE EXPERIENCE

Before setting sail, treat yourself to a stay among the forests and small villages of the **Sunshine Coast**, just a short distance from Vancouver. Here, spring shrouds ancient rainforests in a subtle, mysterious mist, creating atmospheres suspended in time. Hikes along hidden paths lead to pebble beaches and small, quiet coves, where the tides reveal mucilage seaweed and shelters for rare seabirds. In the villages, the local community thrives on art and sustainable fishing, offering traditional canoe-building workshops and tastings of **Pacific** produce. Nights end with clear skies and the rhythmic sound of the waves. This three-night stay is a gentle immersion in nature before entering the heart of the adventure at sea.



REASONS TO GO

As winter gives way to spring, **Johnstone Strait** comes alive with orcas chasing the salmon-rich currents. The cruise explores secluded bays, stopping to admire these majestic creatures in their natural habitat without disturbing them. The coastline unravels through rainforests of centuries-old cedar trees and remote villages where ancient indigenous traditions are still alive. Soft light and silence envelop every landing, offering moments of pure contemplation. Between hiking, kayaking between islands, and encounters with local wildlife, the journey is an invitation to slow down, listen, and be surprised by a wild and authentic spring.

Before setting sail, spend a few days in the remote community of **Klemtu**, a small village on the central coast steeped in indigenous traditions. Here, amidst hidden paths and quiet bays, you can participate in traditional craft workshops and guided tours of the rainforest, where giant red cedars touch the sky. Days alternate between kayaking along the shores, strolling in the shade of conifers, and relaxing on secluded beaches. The mild summer climate makes it all the more enjoyable, while the community welcomes you with warm hospitality and cuisine based on local produce. This three-night stay prepares your heart for a cruise filled with discoveries and natural wonders.



REASONS TO GO

Summer is the ideal season to sail the **Inside Passage**, through deep fjords and islands dotted with rainforests. The **Great Bear Rainforest**, one of the world's last remaining virgin forests, reveals its rich flora and fauna, with brown bears approaching the shores and golden eagles soaring over the calm waters. Stops in secluded bays allow you to immerse yourself in the wilderness, while the long, golden light of summer days transforms every glimpse into a living painting. An experience that combines the profound silence of nature and the vibrant energy of a coast rich in life and ancient stories.

PRE-CRUISE EXPERIENCE

Before setting sail, spend a few days in isolated **Tofino**, on the west coast of **Vancouver Island**, a place where nature reigns supreme. Hike through moss- and fern-covered rainforests, under skies often veiled by a fine, persistent rain that casts a soft, magical light over the landscape. Small cafes and local craft shops offer refuge and warmth, while surf culture blends with indigenous traditions, creating a unique atmosphere. The deserted beaches invite long walks, searching for shells, smooth driftwood, and tales of the sea. This three-night stay is a rejuvenating and introspective break, ideal for immersing yourself in the slow, authentic rhythm of the autumn coast.



REASONS TO GO

Autumn along the **British Columbia** coast is an explosion of color and movement: migrating seabirds and salmon animate the waters, while forests turn red and gold under skies laden with clouds and rain. The cruise winds through secluded bays and enchanted forests, offering unique opportunities for nature photography and wildlife observation. The atmosphere is suspended between light mists and water reflections, an invitation to immerse yourself in a rarefied and captivating landscape, where the connection with nature is profound and authentic.

During the most accessible periods, between late spring and early autumn, river and lake cruises also reveal a lesser-known but equally powerful North: tundra landscapes, rivers as wide as seas, and seemingly endless skies. The journey is always profound, built on respect, listening, and the rare opportunity to traverse places that demand slowness, awareness, and wonder. A North that isn't just traversed: it's inhabited, felt, and leaves its mark

From here, we set sail north along a route that alternates navigable stretches with stops on small river beaches, perfect for quiet walks or to discover the tracks left by wildlife. The voyage takes us between river islands, tranquil inlets, and small landings where we can stop to observe moose, beavers, and golden eagles. The days pass slowly, amid the scent of pine trees, the silence of the vast expanses, and the opportunity to connect with local communities, custodians of a profound and vibrant indigenous culture. On board, activities may include workshops with nature guides, observation of Arctic birdlife, or simply moments of contemplation before a dreamlike panorama. The second leg of the journey leads to **Dawson City**, a city symbolic of the Gold Rush, where the river tells stories of pioneers, explorers, and prospectors. Here, you can visit ancient mines, artisan workshops, and small museums preserving the **Klondike's** cultural heritage. Some stops include on-land experiences: tundra walks, photography workshops, and meetings with local artisans and storytellers. The final stretch of the journey encompasses the most remote part of the river, where the tundra opens up and sunsets last for hours. In this suspended landscape, evenings are spent on board, under a sky that, in the luckiest months, lights up with the Northern Lights even in late summer. The journey ends amid profound silence, pristine bodies of water, and the knowledge of having explored one of the planet's last great natural frontiers.

Here, navigation adapts to the geography: you travel on houseboats, catamarans, or equipped motoryachts, perfect for exploring remote bays, pristine islands, and villages accessible only by water. The journey begins in **Yellowknife**, a vibrant capital city overlooking the lake, where you can encounter **Dene** culture and admire local soapstone and caribou hide crafts. You then sail to **Old Town Bay**, a more historic and fascinating area, among colorful huts on the water and artists' workshops. From here, you leave the city to venture into wilder waters, such as **Cameron Bay** or the northeastern stretch of the lake, where you can stop for hiking, fishing, birdwatching, or simply to listen to the wind blowing through the aspen trees. The cool, bright nights offer endless skies, stars, and—in the right months—the Northern Lights, even in summer, visible as early as late August in the darkest areas. Anchorages are completely safe, often at anchor or at floating lodges offering simple yet authentic hospitality. Halfway through the itinerary, you can head to the **McLeod Bay Islands**, a sacred site for many local communities, where you can take guided tours with indigenous guides, participate in traditional ceremonies, and discover a different way to experience nature. The journey concludes on a crescendo of emotions, with a slow return journey to Yellowknife through pristine inlets and a final stop at **Fred Henne Territorial Park**, an ideal place to relax on the beach, observe wildlife, or simply surrender to the silence and immensity of a still-untouched territory.

In the heart of the Canadian Arctic, Nunavut reveals itself as an extreme, remote, and unforgettable place. The itinerary winds through the fjords of **Baffin Island**'s east coast, navigating safely through the short but intense Arctic summer, when the ice retreats and gives way to clear waters dotted with icebergs, seals, and, with a bit of luck, beluga whales or narwhals.

Departure is from **Pond Inlet**, a small Inuit village overlooking **Lancaster Sound**, where the Arctic landscape explodes in silent and dazzling beauty. The first few days are dedicated to sailing between **Bylot Islands** and the surrounding fjords, with shore excursions led by local guides, allowing you to discover the tundra flora, migratory bird nests, and archaeological remains of ancient Inuit settlements.

We continue along **Eclipse Sound**, where mountains plunge into the sea and glaciers are reflected in still waters. Overnight stays are spent on board, at anchor or at selected anchorages, in complete safety, often under clear skies where the light never sets. Activities include kayaking among small icebergs, wildlife observation, nature photography, and moments of pure contemplation.

Halfway through the journey, you'll reach **Sirmilik National Park**, one of the most remote and fascinating areas in the entire Arctic. Here, glacial landscapes alternate with green summer plains, home to caribou, arctic foxes, and colonies of seabirds. Some stops on land include visits to small Inuit communities who open their homes and workshops to share art, cuisine, and oral stories passed down through generations.

The return to **Pond Inlet** concludes the week with one of the most surreal spectacles: the midnight sun reflecting off the blue icebergs, creating unreal colors and a sense of absolute suspension. A rare experience, bringing you closer to the essence of the Arctic world without compromising its delicate beauty.

A river itinerary that follows the majestic course of the **Mackenzie River**, one of the longest and most remote in the Americas, tracing a slow and fascinating journey from the shores of **Great Slave Lake** to the lands where the river dissolves into the **Beaufort Sea**. A crossing that connects the Northwest Territories and the southern edge of Nunavut, amidst powerful nature and direct contact with local communities. Departure is near **Fort Providence**, on houseboats or motoryachts equipped for river navigation. The river is wide and deep, navigating its way between pine forests, rocky outcrops, and extensive wetlands that shelter bears, lynx, deer, and a surprising variety of waterfowl. Each stop is an opportunity to disembark and explore untrodden paths, small settlements, and quiet beaches. The journey continues toward **Fort Simpson**, a historic meeting place of cultures and trade, where you can visit local museums and participate in meetings with **Dene** community elders. The days pass slowly, amid abundant sunlight, traditional fishing, and nature observation activities. Some sections of the journey include short excursions by kayak or local rafts to reach narrower secondary areas, where the landscape becomes more intimate. Halfway through, the route enters a region where the river takes center stage: wide bends, central islands, and deserted stretches offer perfect anchorages for watching the sunset or photographing the sky, often already illuminated by faint summer auroras in the darkest hours of late August. The final stage of the journey reaches the **Tsiigehtchic** area, where the Mackenzie meets the **Arctic Red River**, in a spectacular fusion of waters, cultures, and colors. From here, you can continue for a day or two toward the **Mackenzie Delta**, navigating a changing landscape: shallow waters, arctic vegetation, Inuit villages, and coastal communities overlooking the southern edge of the Beaufort Sea. Arriving in this far corner of the continent offers a powerful and silent finale: the Arctic wind, the first low fogs, the still waters, and the tales of the Northerners make this journey a profound experience, outside of time and off the beaten track.

This three-night stay is a ritual of entry into the Great North, before departing by sea.



REASONS TO GO

As June approaches the Arctic, the ice begins to retreat, opening fragile but navigable corridors between the **islands of Nunavut** and the **Northwest Passage**. **Cruises** set out to discover one of the planet's least contaminated regions, amidst deep fjords, drifting ice floes, and silent icebergs. Stops at Inuit villages offer a glimpse into ancient cultures that resist time and climate. Beluga whales, walrus, and polar bears are part of a majestic yet fragile landscape. Each day is marked by continuous light, sidereal landscapes, and a sense of absolute presence in nature. An extreme and delicate experience, for those who long to hear the world when it is silent.

The voyage continues along the northern edge of **Massasauga Provincial Park**, where twisted pines, deer, and bald eagles frame days of tranquility and beauty. Stops ashore offer opportunities for swimming in inland lakes, picnicking with local produce, or guided tours of the area's indigenous villages, where art, spirituality, and ecological knowledge are deeply intertwined.

Halfway along the route, you reach **Killbear Point**, famous for its pink granite cliffs and secluded beaches. Here, you can moor near the park and hike along scenic trails that offer spectacular views of **Georgian Bay**, with sunsets that resemble watercolor paintings.

The final route winds westward, through tranquil channels, deep blue waters, and seemingly floating islets. The most authentic Quebec unfolds along the wide, silent banks of the **St. Lawrence**, a river that resembles a sea, steeped in history, nature, and French memories. The itinerary winds through **Tadoussac**, the **Côte-Nord**, and the smaller bays hidden between the mountains and the coast: a journey between land and water, discovering secret fjords, secluded lighthouses, and encounters with whales.

The route begins in **Tadoussac**, a small port nestled between the St. Lawrence River and the Saguenay Fjord. After visiting the old chapel and strolling along the riverfront, we set sail for the **Saguenay-Saint-Laurent Marine Park**, one of the world's best areas for beluga and blue whale watching. The journey is slow and respectful, and every day brings new marine surprises.

We continue towards **Baie Sainte-Marguerite**, where you can anchor in the harbor and hike up to the cliff-top viewpoints, or take a guided hike among pine trees, lichens, and moose tracks. The landscape is powerful, yet tranquil: wide open spaces, water everywhere, and villages that seem to have emerged from a 19th-century novel.

Halfway through the route, you ascend part of the **Saguenay Fjord**, with its sheer cliffs plunging into the water and dense forests that seem to hold ancient secrets. Some stops include visits to small French-Canadian communities, where artisanal cheeses are produced, traditional songs are sung, and the Quebecois *joie de vivre* is celebrated.

The journey concludes between the inner bays of **Baie Éternité** and **Anse Saint-Jean**, remote places where time seems to have stood still. The last night is spent moored under a clear sky, where the sunset lingers and the water reflects the very essence of Quebec: slow, deep, ancient.

It begins in **St. Anthony**, a small port overlooking a stretch of sea where, between June and July, gigantic icebergs, which have drifted down from Greenland, float.

The voyage begins in the direction of **Gros Morne National Park**, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, a place seemingly sculpted from another era. The boats enter the narrow fjords of **Bonne Bay**, where mountains drop sheer into the water and the silence is broken only by the song of seabirds. Here, you can take short shore excursions, following trails through peat bogs and boreal mosses, or stop at anchor to enjoy seemingly endless sunsets.

We then ascend towards the **Green Gardens Coast**, where red and green cliffs create landscapes of rare beauty. Some hidden coves offer discreet landings, perfect for a solitary picnic or wildlife observation: red foxes, sea eagles, and curious seals.

Halfway through the voyage, you'll reach **L'Anse aux Meadows**, a Viking archaeological site that testifies to the earliest European presence in the Americas. A local guide will lead you through the peat and wood reconstructions, while on board you'll savor stone-baked bread and smoked salmon.

The journey continues along **Cape Onion** and the smaller islands near the **Strait of Belle Isle**, where the summer sea ice allows for cautious approach. In some stretches, it's possible to spot humpback whales, minke whales, and even puffins skimming the water.

The route concludes among the bays of **Quirpon Island**, a place where time stands still. The last night is spent moored in front of an ancient lighthouse transformed into an eco-lodge, overlooking the **Labrador Sea** and the distant echo of cracking ice. A powerful finale, suspended between legend, the **Atlantic**, and wonder.

The **Bay of Fundy** is one of the most astonishing places on the planet: its tides, among the highest in the world, transform the landscape every six hours, creating unique visual and sensory magic. This itinerary begins in **St. Andrews-by-the-Sea**, an elegant and relaxed town, perfect for stocking up on supplies and sampling the local cuisine.

We set sail for **Minister's Island**, accessible only at low tide, when the sand rises to form a natural bridge. A stroll among ancient homes, gardens, and waterfronts introduces us to the ever-changing rhythm of this land.

The voyage continues along the bay's rugged coastline toward **Grand Manan Island**, a paradise for bird, whale, and lighthouse lovers. Stops include excursions to small fishing villages, including **Seal Cove** and **North Head**, where time moves to the rhythm of the tides and fish is still dried in the open air.

Halfway through the voyage, explore the **Hopewell Rocks**, natural red rock sculptures that emerge or disappear depending on the tide. You can anchor nearby and, if the timing is right, literally walk on the ocean floor. These flowerpot formations are one of Atlantic Canada's most iconic sights.

The second leg of the route passes through **Alma** and the edges of **Fundy National Park**, where forests overlook spectacular inlets. Hikes along the park's trails or a dip in the natural pools complete the experience of land and sea.

The journey ends near **Cape Enrage**, with its imposing cliffs, changing light, and the old lighthouse dominating the horizon. A night at anchor here, with the tide slowly ebbing beneath the hull, gives the feeling of being part of a millennia-old phenomenon: a final lesson in awe, silence, and wonder.

The itinerary begins in **Charlottetown**, the elegant yet human-sized capital, where it's pleasant to stroll among historic buildings and small cafés overlooking the harbor. The voyage begins northeast, toward **Baie Fortune**, dotted with islets and white sand dunes. Here, you can drop anchor for a night at anchor, overlooking meadows populated by migratory birds. The atmosphere is peaceful, nature is close by, and the sunset lights paint everything pink and gold.

We continue along the east coast, dotted with red and white lighthouses, cultivated fields, and small landing places where time seems to have stood still. A stop in **Souris** allows you to disembark to visit local markets, enjoy freshly caught lobster, and stroll along the sheer cliffs.

Halfway through the journey, we turn toward **Prince Edward Island National Park**, along the north coast, where shifting dunes, lagoons, and endless beaches create a poetic and fragile landscape. In some places, you can swim or spot seals; in others, you can simply stand in silence.

Spend a day sailing between **Malpeque Bay** and **Richmond Bay**, where oyster farming coexists with maritime tradition and the colorful fishermen's houses tell of a vibrant era. The small ports of **Kensington** and **Summerside** offer convenient docking and restaurants serving local produce.

The journey concludes along the southwest coast, with a stop near **West Point Lighthouse**, one of Canada's most photographed lighthouses. The last evening is spent moored among the dunes and red sands of the west coast, with a light breeze and the **Atlantic** closing the circle, amidst sea, light, and island tranquility.

A stop on **Entry Island**, a small English-speaking community surrounded by green hills and grazing sheep, offers an immersion in the simplicity of island life: perfect for scenic walks and encounters with the locals. We then sail to **Miscou Island, New Brunswick**, among red bogs, centuries-old lighthouses, and lagoons teeming with birdlife, where we stop for guided kayak excursions and dinners with local fishermen. The itinerary concludes on **Grand Manan**, a wild and windswept island with dramatic cliffs, spectacular lighthouses, and a long tradition of whale and seabird watching. Seven days of oceanic silence, tenacious cultures, and landscapes where the Atlantic meets the land with power and poetry.
