Cultural institutions can collaborate with distributed museums. community archives. centers. art participatory projects rooted in the local fabric. In Italy, education is intertwined with beauty, complexity, and living memory, making the country an open laboratory where new ways of inhabiting the present and imagining the future are being experimented with.











#### **ITALY - NORTH**

#### **PIEDMONT**

Nestled between the Alps and rolling hills, Piedmont is crisscrossed by a network of historic cities, converted industrial areas, and outstanding agricultural landscapes. Here, the dialogue between tradition and innovation thrives in urban and rural settings, offering a wealth of educational and cultural opportunities.

Secondary schools: exploring paths of industrial memory, resistance, and agri-food sustainability.

Universities: they explore models of urban regeneration, social research, and cultural innovation.

Cultural institutions: establish collaborations with ecomuseums, labor archives, and local innovation centers.

#### TRENTINO-ALTO ADIGE

A bilingual, Alpine, and culturally diverse region, Trentino-Alto Adige is a bridge between Italy and the Germanic world. Its cities and valleys showcase models of coexistence, autonomy, and sustainability.

Secondary schools: experience linguistic minorities, mountain biodiversity, and active citizenship.

#### **ITALY - CENTER**

#### **MARCHE**

#### **ABRUZZO**

A land of mountain resilience and pristine landscapes, Abruzzo preserves a profound connection between nature and culture. Its inland areas offer opportunities for environmental education, anthropology, and memory.

**Secondary schools:** explore abandoned villages, protected areas, and pastoral traditions.

Universities: they study internal areas, territorial fragility, and self-sufficiency practices.

#### **PUGLIA**

Secondary schools: study agricultural landscapes, migratory practices, and marine biodiversity.

Universities: they dedicate themselves to research on coastal development, agroecology, and Mediterranean mobility.

Cultural institutions: they collaborate with local foundations and island entities on widespread heritage and participation.



#### **ITALY - SOUTH**

#### **BASILICATA**

A region of eloquent voids and strong historical sedimentations, Basilicata invites you to discover the cultural landscape and social experimentation among its mountains and rocks

Secondary schools: exploring landscape archaeology, community resilience, and local narratives.

**Universities:** they delve into studies on territorial regeneration, documentary filmmaking, and cultural geographies.

Cultural institutions: they work with Lucanian communities on processes of memory and cultural innovation on the margins.



#### **ITALY - SOUTH**


#### **CALABRIA**

#### **ITALY - SOUTH**

#### **SICILY**

Cultural institutions: they initiate projects with ethnographic museums, community archives, and local artists to reflect on heritage and self-determination.

# BETWEEN DIFFUSE MEMORY, FRAGILE TERRITORIES AND CIVIC IMAGINATION

#### AN INTERDISCIPLINARY JOURNEY TO ITALY

Italy is a dense and multifaceted educational laboratory, where historical stratifications, cultural landscapes, and social experiments intertwine. From the Alpine north to the most remote islands, the country offers an extraordinary wealth of knowledge, narratives, and civic practices. This itinerary invites schools, universities, and cultural institutions to discover marginalized territories, inland areas, and spaces undergoing transformation. Secondary schools can explore models of active citizenship, cultural biodiversity, and the memory of places. Universities encounter resilient communities, participatory research projects, and tangible and intangible heritage. Cultural institutions connect with local networks, dispersed museums, community archives, and experimental artistic practices. Italy, with its diverse geography, thus becomes an ecosystem for learning, reflection, and the generation of shared visions.

## DAY 1 – FRIULI-VENEZIA GIULIA: CULTURAL BOUNDARIES AND LINGUISTIC MINORITIES

In the cross-border landscape of the Gorizia Karst, Italy engages with Central Europe. The focal point of the activities will be the **Slovenian Studies Center** in San Pietro al Natisone, in collaboration with the **University of Udine** and local oral archives

Secondary schools: exploring coexistence between linguistic communities and intercultural education.

Universities: they analyze minority protection policies, the history of borders, and hybrid identities.

Cultural institutions: they launch projects with community archives and documentation centers on cultural diversity.

## DAY 2 – EMILIA-ROMAGNA (TUSCAN-EMILIAN APENNINES): MOUNTAIN RESILIENCE AND REGENERATION

In the villages of the Reggio Emilia Apennines, models of rural rebirth and social sustainability intertwine. The focus of the activities will be the "Apennine Cultural Workshops" project in Ligonchio, in collaboration with Reggio Children and local organizations.

Secondary schools: participate in workshops on the creative reuse of spaces and landscape care.

Universities: they study socio-territorial regeneration processes and new local economies.

**Cultural institutions:** co-design initiatives with schools and associations to enhance the cultural vitality of inland areas.

## DAY 3 – TUSCANY (GIGLIO ISLAND): ISLAND ECOLOGIES AND SUBMERGED MEMORY

In the heart of the Tuscan Archipelago, the island of **Giglio** offers a unique blend of nature, history, and environmental fragility. The focus of the activities will be the **Giglio Castello Environmental Education Center**, in collaboration with the **University of Siena** and local associations.

Secondary schools: participate in itineraries exploring marine biodiversity, environmental risk, and local narratives.

Universities: they work on sustainable tourism, insular anthropology, and climate change.

Cultural institutions: collaborate with local archives and site-specific art projects on memory and landscape.



#### DAY 4 - MOLISE: INLAND AREAS AND HIDDEN HERITAGE

From semi-abandoned villages to communities undergoing transformation, Molise is a laboratory for social and cultural experimentation. The focus of the activities will be the "CAMPOBASE" project in Campobasso, in collaboration with the Sannitico Museum and the Department of Human Sciences at the University of Molise.

**Secondary schools:** they engage in workshops on identity, orality, and new forms of living.

Universities: they study territorial micro-resistance, participatory planning, and slow development models.

**Cultural institutions:** they organize programs with artists, historians, and archives to enhance minor heritage.

## DAY 5 – CALABRIA (GRECANICA): MINORITY CULTURES AND ANTHROPOLOGICAL LANDSCAPES

In the Grecanica Area of Reggio Calabria, between Bova and Roghudi, the Calabrian-Greek language, traditional practices, and abandonment converge. The focus of the activities will be the Grecanicità Cultural Park and the Department of Humanities at the Mediterranean University of Reggio Calabria.

Secondary schools: discover the importance of minority languages and oral heritage.

Universities: they analyze marginalization as a cultural resource and the challenges of educational regeneration.

**Cultural institutions:** they plan multimedia storytelling and participatory mapping of territories.

## DAY 6 – SARDINIA (CAPRERA ISLAND): POLITICAL MEMORY AND HISTORICAL ECOLOGY

On the island of Caprera, part of the La Maddalena Archipelago, the figure of Garibaldi is intertwined with landscapes of extraordinary intensity. The focus of the activities will be the **Garibaldi Compendium** and the **Archipelago National Park**, in collaboration with the **University of Cagliari** and local associations.

Secondary schools: reflect on the relationship between national history, nature, and island identity.

Universities: they develop research on cultural ecologies, political memories, and geographies of resilience.

**Cultural institutions:** they launch projects on historical archives, environmental education, and visual storytelling.

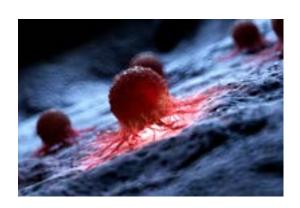
