

ENGLAND

From London's artistic suburbs to the civic centers of the North, passing through experimental architecture and living archives, the journey intertwines learning, experience, and discussion. Designed for secondary schools, universities, and cultural institutions, each stop offers targeted interdisciplinary activities, far from the beaten tourist track. Through urban explorations, participatory projects, and meetings with local professionals, participants will experience the complexity and richness of a vibrant, transforming England. DAY 1 – EAST LONDON: BETWEEN MIGRATION, URBAN ART, AND SOCIAL MEMORY

East London is a laboratory of shifting cultures, where art and memory tell stories of migration and social transformation. The hub of activities will be the Rich Mix Cultural Foundation, a multipurpose space dedicated to culture and community.

Secondary schools: will participate in narrative walks and visual workshops on migrant memory and the neighborhood's social transformations.

Universities: they will study urban regeneration processes and social inclusion practices through workshops and meetings with cultural operators.

Cultural institutions: will collaborate with Rich Mix curators to design cultural initiatives related to urban creativity and diversity.

DAY 2 – BIRMINGHAM: BETWEEN DIASPORIC CULTURES AND CIVIC INNOVATION

Birmingham is distinguished by its diaspora communities and commitment to cultural and civic regeneration. Activities will center around the **Ikon Gallery**, a contemporary art center that engages with local communities.

Secondary schools: will take part in multimedia workshops on intercultural identity and representation.

Universities: they will explore the urban and social dynamics linked to diasporic cultures in the United Kingdom by participating in seminars and guided tours. Cultural institutions: will meet with Ikon operators to discuss models of cultural mediation and inclusion.


DAY 3 – LIVERPOOL: BETWEEN PORTS, COLONIALISM, AND MUSICAL MEMORY

Liverpool is a city with deep roots and intertwined histories of trade, migration, and pop culture. The heart of the day will be the **Museum of Liverpool**, custodian of collective memory and urban transformation.

Secondary schools: will experience immersive museum tours related to migration, slavery, and folk music.

University: they will conduct studies on the identity dynamics linked to port and post-colonial history.

Cultural institutions: will collaborate with curators to develop projects for historical narration and heritage enhancement.



DAY 4 – SHEFFIELD: BETWEEN INDUSTRIAL ARCHAEOLOGY AND ENVIRONMENTAL REGENERATION

Bristol is a dynamic hub of artistic and cultural activism, promoting new forms of participation and citizenship. The hub of activities will be **We The Curious**, an interactive science and art center.

Secondary schools: will explore street art and its role as a language of protest and active citizenship by participating in creative workshops.

University: they will study urban cultures and visual activism through seminars and guided site visits.

Cultural institutions: will work with the center's operators to design public art and civic education initiatives.

From the creative alleys of Cardiff to the trails of Snowdonia National Park, this region intertwines oral history, working-class memory, and cultural regeneration. Participants will explore living archives, university campuses immersed in nature, and civic centers animated by new energies. The journey thus becomes a laboratory of discovery and connection, where secondary schools initiate programs of informed citizenship, universities develop local research, and cultural institutions encounter innovative conservation practices. Wales reveals itself as an authentic, dynamic learning space, deeply connected to its community.

DAY 1 – CARDIFF: CULTURAL CAPITAL AND IDENTITY LABORATORY

Cardiff combines Welsh spirit with a contemporary vision. Activities will take place at the Wales Millennium Centre, a symbol of the city's cultural renaissance and a multidisciplinary educational hub.

Secondary schools: will take part in theatre and creative workshops on the theme of local identity and the Welsh language.

University: they will explore models of urban regeneration and cultural policies in the capital.

Cultural institutions: will engage with operators and curators to plan initiatives on interculturality and multilingualism.

DAY 2 – BLAENAVON: INDUSTRIAL ARCHAEOLOGY AND WORKERS' MEMORY

Known for its International Eisteddfod performing arts festival, Llangollen is a symbolic place for cultural encounters. Activities will be held at the Llangollen Pavilion, the heart of the festival.

Secondary schools: will participate in traditional dance and music workshops

with an intercultural perspective.


Universities: will explore the festival's role in cultural diplomacy and artistic explores.

Secondary schools, universities, and cultural institutions will thus be able to enjoy a rich and dynamic experience, combining active discovery, direct interaction with local communities, and interdisciplinary insights. This journey stimulates critical thinking and global awareness, revealing how past and future merge in constant

DAY 1 – GLASGOW: BETWEEN URBAN REGENERATION AND CONTEMPORARY CULTURE

After four days exploring vibrant cities and historic villages, the journey arrives in the Orcadian archipelago, home to one of Europe's oldest Neolithic civilizations. From stone circles, millennia-old excavations, and resilient cultural communities, Orkney offers a unique and immersive learning experience. Designed for secondary schools, universities, and cultural institutions, the itinerary features activities that emphasize landscape memory, the interplay between past and future, and the importance of heritage as an educational resource. A dynamic experience to understand the relationship between marginalized territories, innovation, and cultural identity.

DAY 1 – EDINBURGH: CULTURAL POLITICS AND URBAN HISTORY

Scotland's cultural capital, **Edinburgh** is a civic and institutional hub where history, architecture, and innovation coexist. Activities will be held at the **University of Edinburgh**, focusing on urban heritage and cultural policy.

Secondary schools: will visit the city through interactive historical itineraries and workshops on urban memory.

Universities: they will analyze cultural management policies and inclusion models through case studies.

Cultural institutions: will participate in working groups with researchers and practitioners to explore best practices in urban development.

DAY 2 – DUNDEE: DIGITAL CREATIVITY AND URBAN REGENERATION

Dundee is a city undergoing profound renewal, home to the first V&A museum outside London. The activities will be held at the V&A **Dundee**, a contemporary art and design center overlooking the River Tay.

DAY 3 – ABERDEEN: ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND MARITIME HERITAGE

Aberdeen represents the bridge between energy innovation and maritime history. Activities will take place at the Maritime Museum and Robert Gordon University, which is active in environmental research.

Secondary schools: will explore coastal heritage with a focus on ecosystems and the history of maritime communities.

Cultural institutions: will develop integrated promotion proposals combining science, history, and community.



DAY 4 – INVERNESS: GAELIC IDENTITY AND LANDSCAPE ENHANCEMENT

Inverness, nestled in the Highlands, is a key place to understand Gaelic culture and its connection to the land. Activities will be based at UHI Inverness College.

Secondary schools: will participate in excursions and workshops related to natural and linguistic heritage.

After four stops among coastal towns, remote glens, and vibrant cultural centers, the journey concludes on the islands of Lewis and Harris, lands of ancient legends and advanced sustainability projects. Designed for secondary schools, universities, and cultural institutions, the itinerary offers interdisciplinary activities in authentic settings, amidst resilient communities, living archives, and speaking landscapes. Study days highlight local knowledge, the Gaelic language, craftsmaship, and contemporary environmental challenges. An itinerary where past and future intertwine in high-impact educational experiences, amid fjords, cliffs, and widespread culture.

DAY 1 – GLASGOW: CULTURAL CITIZENSHIP AND SOCIAL CREATIVITY

Glasgow is Scotland's capital of independent culture and social excitement. The activities will be held at the Centre for Contemporary Arts (CCA), a hub for artistic practices and active citizenship.

Secondary schools: will participate in artistic workshops on the themes of social justice and the city as an educational space.

University: they will study models of independent and inclusive cultural production.

Cultural institutions: will collaborate with cultural activators to exchange ideas on participatory art practices and urban cohesion.

DAY 2 – STIRLING: NATIONAL HISTORY AND THE MEMORY OF CONFLICTS

Stirling is a symbol of Scottish identity and war memory. Activities will be held at the Stirling Smith Art Gallery & Museum and Stirling University.

DAY 3 – FORT WILLIAM: MOUNTAIN LANDSCAPE AND SUSTAINABILITY

In the heart of the Western Highlands, Fort William is a hub of adventure, conservation, and local culture. Activities will take place at the Nevis Landscape Partnership.

Secondary schools: will participate in educational excursions on the relationship between people, the environment, and the history of the Highlands.

University: they will study sustainability and co-design projects for mountain landscapes.

Cultural institutions: will collaborate with environmental organizations and local artists to explore ecological and identity narratives.



DAY 4 – ULLAPOOL: CULTURAL PORT AND STORYTELLING

NORTHERN IRELAND

Northern Ireland offers a rich cultural landscape of contrasts and inspiration, where ancient traditions intertwine with processes of urban regeneration and social innovation. Secondary schools educational experiences related to history, civil rights, and natural landscapes. Universities find a stimulating environment for deepening studies on reconciliation, and sustainable contemporary art, development. Cultural institutions have access to iconic sites and vibrant communities to experiment with inclusive and participatory practices. From the vibrant streets of Belfast to the tranquil countryside, Northern Ireland offers a unique opportunity for critical learning and intercultural dialogue.

AN INTERDISCIPLINARY JOURNEY TO NORTHERN IRELAND

Northern Ireland is a land of fertile contrasts and powerful narratives: from the scars of the past to visions of the future, from wild coastlines to urban art, every place is charged with meaning. This itinerary offers an immersive experience in processes of reconciliation, creative regeneration practices, and landscapes steeped in memory. Ideal for secondary schools, universities, and cultural institutions, the journey alternates between urban centers and rural areas, always adopting a critical and interdisciplinary approach. Through meetings, explorations, and workshops in authentic contexts, participants will engage in active learning experiences that interrogate history, community, and territory. This journey helps understand the past to generate new visions of the present.

DAY 1 – BELFAST: URBAN MEMORY AND RECONCILIATION PRACTICES

Belfast, the capital of Northern Ireland, is both a cultural crossroads and a laboratory for peace. The activities will take place at the Belfast Interface Project, an organization committed to reconciliation and the transformation of contested spaces.

Secondary schools: will participate in narrative tours of the murals and workshops on urban memory and identity.

University: they will analyze post-conflict processes and cohesion policies in divided neighborhoods.

Cultural institutions: will collaborate with local mediators to design narrative and symbolic regeneration interventions.

DAY 2 – DERRY/LONDONDERRY: CITY OF DIALOGUE AND EMERGING CREATIVITY

Derry, a city symbolic of the Northern Ireland conflict, is today a hotbed of artistic and social practices oriented towards reconciliation. The activities will be held at the **Nerve Centre**, a cultural center dedicated to participatory art and digital media.

Secondary schools: will participate in digital storytelling workshops to tell community stories.

University: they will explore the role of the arts in peacebuilding and collective identity building processes.

Cultural institutions: will collaborate with artists and curators to co-design intercultural initiatives in sensitive areas.

DAY 3 – ARMAGH: SPIRITUALITY, SCIENCE, AND TERRITORIAL STORYTELLING

An ancient ecclesiastical capital, Armagh is today a hub for dialogue between religion, science, and culture. Activities will take place at the Armagh Observatory and Planetarium, where science and cosmology intertwine with ancient narratives.

Secondary schools: will have educational experiences on astronomy, myths, and Celtic cosmologies.

University: will explore the intersection of scientific knowledge and spiritual traditions.

Cultural institutions: will develop interdisciplinary projects that combine scientific languages and narrative heritage.



DAY 4 – GIANT'S CAUSEWAY: GEOLOGY, MYTHS, AND A PROTECTED LANDSCAPE

The **Giant's Causeway** is a UNESCO World Heritage site, where science meets mythology. Activities will take place at the **Giant's Causeway Visitor Centre**, a hub for landscape interpretation.

Secondary schools: will participate in excursions and workshops on local myths and geological forms.

University: they will study the interactions between natural landscape, cultural memory, and sustainability.

Cultural institutions: will collaborate on environmental awareness and ecological storytelling initiatives.

DAY 5 – BALLYCASTLE AND THE GLENS OF ANTRIM: ORALITY, MUSIC AND RURAL IDENTITY

Amidst the poetic landscapes of the Glens, **Ballycastle** is a vibrant hub of rural culture and oral traditions. Activities will take place at the **Glens Storytelling** and **Heritage Centre**.

Secondary schools: will take part in traditional music and interactive storytelling workshops.

University: they will analyze intangible heritage conservation practices in local communities.

Cultural institutions: will engage with artists, living archives, and cultural mediators for intergenerational transmission projects.

DAY 6 – DOWNPATRICK: ARCHAEOLOGY, LANDSCAPE AND TERRITORIAL MEMORY

Downpatrick, with its historic towns, green hills, and ancient routes, is the perfect place to explore the relationship between territory, archaeology, and narrative identity. Activities will be held at the **Down County Museum**, housed in a former Georgian prison and now a vibrant center for historical research and outreach.

Secondary schools: will participate in interactive workshops on the evolution of the territory and daily life in past centuries.

University: they will deepen their knowledge of field research methodologies and the valorization of minor archaeological heritage.

Cultural institutions: will collaborate with the museum team to design initiatives related to the memory of places and contemporary museum narratives.

University: they will study urban and cultural regeneration strategies implemented through artistic practices.

Cultural institutions: will engage with local operators on collaborative cultural programming models.


DAY 3 – GALWAY: GAELIC CULTURE AND COMMUNITY SUSTAINABILITY

Kilkenny is known for its strong connection between traditional craftsmanship and design innovation. The activities will take place at the National Design & Craft Gallery, a hub for contemporary practices rooted in the region.

Secondary schools: will participate in creative workshops using local materials, ancient techniques, and modern design.

University: they will study the processes of transmitting artisanal knowledge and local production networks.

Cultural institutions: will plan cultural cooperation activities with artisans, designers, and curators.

DAY 6 – CORK: CULTURAL RESISTANCE AND SOCIAL INNOVATION

A port city and a rebellious hub, Cork is a hub for cultural and social experimentation. Activities will be held at the Cork City Library and the independent space Sample-Studios.

Secondary schools: will experience an urban storytelling workshop through words, images, and sounds.

Universities: they will focus on social innovation and new artistic practices for cultural inclusion

Cultural institutions: will collaborate with artists and civic leaders to co-design community storytelling initiatives.

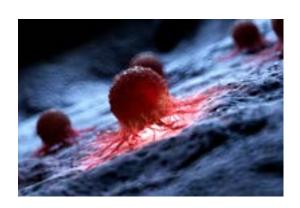
